The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2024.

Principal Activity and Review of the Business

The principal activity of the company is to manage, operate and promote the Joyce Tower as a key cultural tourism attraction and to contribute to Joyce's literary legacy, under licence from Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council (DLRCC).

The Company is limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

There has been no significant change in these activities during the financial year ended 31 December 2024.

Joyce Tower & Museum (JTM) is funded predominantly by a grant of €100,000 per annum provided by DLRCC as part of the operating licence agreed between both parties. Under this licence, DLRCC has committed to funding JTM for a period of 10 years. The company does not charge an admission fee to enter the Tower but receives cash donations from visitors.

The major cost to the company are salaries, PRSI and the facility management contract. Annually, these items total approx. €70,000. The balance of the income (grant funding and the cash donations) is allocated to utilities, events, care for collection, repairs and maintenance, insurance, communication etc. Current spending is within the amounts budgeted in the annual budget.

Governance

In the period since the second AGM, the board has held 12 meetings, plus a day-long meeting devoted to strategy in November 2024 to facilitate the updating of the board's strategic plan and safety statement. Governance issues are discussed at every board meeting and policies are continually under review. A sub-committee has been established with responsibility for Finance and Financial Oversight. The composition of the board has been reviewed continually to ensure that we have the necessary expertise to discharge our responsibilities. One trustee, Ms. Trish Cronin, resigned on 6th January 2025 and was replaced in February 2025 by Ms. Fran Spillane. Fran will serve as the JTM representative on the Charities Regulator Governance Forum. The board has applied for interim accreditation on the Museums Standards Programme for Ireland (MSPI) and has had one inspection to date. The Visual Identity project has been completed with the supply of relevant templates for signage and communication. Visitor numbers were down slightly on last year in line with a general trend in the industry. It is intended to extend the opening hours in the summer months and this should help to increase numbers.

Manager/Curator

The work of the Manager-Curator Dr. Alice Ryan, whose contract has been confirmed with a highly satisfactory performance review in July 2024 has contributed greatly to the work of the board. Meetings are facilitated by comprehensive reports based on a template derived from the Annual Plan covering administrative, governance and financial aspects as well as issues relating to the physical maintenance of the Tower and to events. These events included the on-going programme of artistic and cultural events focusing on the Tower itself and on its heritage as an iconic element of the legacy of James Joyce.

It is a matter of great satisfaction that Alice has been invited to address an important James Joyce conference in Trieste in late June 2025. There is no doubt that this will enhance the profile of the Tower among scholars and is an affirmation of the scholarship of the manager/curator herself. The lecture she will deliver will be based on the Tower collection.

Alice has also attended a number of training events during the year on topics related to her work, including management of volunteers. It is worth noting that a board member Andrew Basquille also addressed a Joyce conference in Rome.

Alice has also conducted a well-attended course on Reading Ulysses during the year.

It is greatly to Alice's credit that she has been successful in securing grant support for many of our activities, most recently the grant for our website.

Collection

The Tower Collection is the property of Fáilte Ireland who have licensed it to Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council. An annual meeting takes place between the curator, DLR and Fáilte to consider any issues arising, including additions. A comprehensive paper conservation programme has been completed and attention is now being given to conservation of some other artifacts, including the Joyce waistcoat. An acquisitions policy and a disposal policy have been adopted. Notable additions to the collection in the summer of 2024 included a copy of The Lovesongs of

for the financial year ended 31 December 2024 Connaught by Douglas Hyde and the Gerry O Flaherty archive.

The Manager/curator has made imaginative use of interns to assist with routine matters regarding the collection.

The Collection is the subject of a publication currently being written by the Manager/curator which will be a valuable resource and available for sale to visitors.

Friends of Joyce Tower and Museum

The Tower has a large number of Friends, many of whom are also volunteers in the Tower. Many attend Joyce related courses, including Finnegans Wake in Fitzgeralds Pub, or Alice's Ulysses course in the Tower. They also arrange various trips and lectures. A particular highlight was the publication of Heartbeats of the Joyce Tower which captures the volunteer experience, and which was launched on October 8th 2024. This was funded by a residual fund donated by the earlier FJT organisation. A trip to Galway exploring Joyce links and a lecture on George Moore were also organised. A visit to Paris took place in May 2024 which brought us around Joyce related sites in that city. We were also honoured to be invited to the Irish embassy there by His Excellency Niall Burgess, a former Saturday volunteer himself!

The Volunteers programme in Joyce Tower is unique and adds a quality to the experience of visitors to the Tower that is evident in the remarks they make in the visitors' book. It is hugely interesting to the visitor to have an introduction to Joyce's work and to the Tower delivered by a knowledgeable and enthusiastic evangelist!

Training of volunteers. Alice organised a series of training workshops for volunteers in the course of the year. This includes familiarisation with the collection and health and safety.

Financial

Brian Rankin has been appointed Treasurer to the board and a Finance subcommittee has been established under his direction. The subcommittee has met twice and terms of reference have been agreed. Also prepared are the financial policies and guidelines.

Events

The manager/curator organises three different major events in the course of the year: Bloomsday, which occurs each year on 16th June and is a highlight for many Joyceans; Joyce birthday celebrations around the 2nd February, and Joycenights, a recent innovation marking the period when Joyce stayed in the Tower in September 1904. All of these events were very well supported by Friends and the general public, and the Bloomsday events in particular attracted significant media attention.

The Tower participates in DLR Coastival events organised by DLR

Some smaller events including an art exhibition and a presentation by the New Lacanian School also took place

Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council

The board is grateful for the very committed support of Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council throughout the year. Joyce Tower and Museum CLG is of course licensed by DLR to manage the Tower and has two representatives on the board, Tourism officer Dave Lawless and Heritage Officer Deirdre Black. The Tower receives the major part of its funding from DLR and we are delighted to welcome An Cathaoirleach to the Tower on Bloomsday each year. The DLR Lexicon has hosted many of our events and provides a meeting room for our board meetings. The Tower also benefits from the free Shuttle Bus which brings tourists down along the coast with a handy stop in Sandycove.

It was also gratifying to be name-checked by Minister Catherine Martin at the launch of the new tourism strategy.

Financial Results

The (deficit)/surplus for the financial year after providing for depreciation amounted to €(15,545) (2023 - €35,044).

At the end of the financial year, the company has assets of €107,957 (2023 - €115,364) and liabilities of €14,400 (2023 - €6,262). The net assets of the company have decreased by €(15,545).

The charity received grants of €110,074 (2023 - €108,890) of which €100,000 was received from DLRCC. Expenditure in 2024 came to €160,540 (2023 - €120,545) with other income received from visitor direct donations and book and ticket sales totalling €34,484 (2023 - €46,710).

The JTM reserve policy is to maintain unrestricted financial reserves to continue to operate for at least 3 months and meet its financial obligations as they fall due.

In accordance with the Constitution, the directors retire by rotation and, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

Future Developments

Building

The physical condition of the Tower building has been a matter of acute concern to the board. A report was commissioned from Shaffrey Architects to address two aspects in particular, water ingress and the installation of a stairway where there had been one originally. The latter would also improve health and safety standards in the building. The outline scheme devised also included the provision of more adequate accommodation for the manager/curator. Estimated cost for the work comes to €625,000 and an approach for funding will be made in the near future to the OPW who are ultimately responsible for the physical fabric of the Tower. The manager/curator has prepared a comprehensive document, a Case for Support which will be presented to funding bodies. This is an urgent priority.

Day-to-day irritants include the inadequate kitchen and toilet facilities and the very draughty front door. The pigeon problem has been addressed to a satisfactory degree for the moment.

Website

The Tower website is in urgent need of complete overhaul and a process is underway at the moment to do so. We have just received confirmation of a Heritage Council grant to undertake this task. A working party led by board members Helen Gallivan and Deirdre Black and including Alice has been established and a comprehensive specification document has been prepared. This is a top priority for the immediate future. We must harness digital technology to engage with national and international audiences. It should also be a vehicle for fundraising. We received €7,074 of an approved grant amount of €26,397 during the financial year.

Post Statement of Financial Position Events

There have been no significant events affecting the company since the financial year-end.

Political Contributions

The company did not make any disclosable political donations in the current financial year.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Joyce Tower & Museum CLG ('the company') for the financial year ended 31 December 2024 which comprise the Income Statement, the Statement of Financial Position, the Statement of Changes in Equity and the related notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish Law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", issued in the United Kingdom by the Financial Reporting Council, applying Section 1A of that Standard.

1. General Information

Joyce Tower & Museum CLG is a company limited by guarantee incorporated and registered in Ireland. The registered number of the company is 714135 and RCN number is 20206583. The registered office of the company is Joyce Tower, Sandycove Point, Dun Laoghaire, Dublin which is also the principal place of business of the company. The nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' Report. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the company.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the company for the financial year ended 31 December 2024 have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 Section 1A (Small Entities) and the Companies Act 2014.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention except for certain properties and financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" Section 1A, issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

The company qualifies as a small company as defined by section 280A of the Companies Act 2014 in respect of the financial year, and has applied the rules of the 'Small Companies Regime' in accordance with section 280C of the Companies Act 2014 and Section 1A of FRS 102.

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the company is entitled to the income, receipt is probable, and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Grants

Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the company, are recognised when the company becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donations

The company derives a portion of it's income from public donations. This income is recognised with effect from the time it is received into the company's bank account or entered into the company's accounting records.

Membership

The charity runs a membership programme that encourages members of the public to support the activities of Joyce Tower Museum CLG. All membership income received during the year came from individual members of the public.

Books

Income from the sale of books is recognised when the books are sold to customers. The income is recorded at the amount received or receivable, excluding any discounts or VAT (if applicable).

Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of property, plant and equipment, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

33.33% Straight line

The carrying values of tangible fixed assets are reviewed annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts except where the effect of discounting would be immaterial. In such cases the receivables are stated at cost less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the Statement of Financial Position bank overdrafts are shown within Creditors.

Trade and other creditors

Trade and other creditors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

Taxation

Joyce Tower & Museum CLG is a registered charity and as such is exempt from corporation tax under Section 208 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997 (Revenue Commissioners' registration number 4004145LH).

3. Departure from Companies Act 2014 Presentation

The directors have elected to present an Income and Expenditure Account instead of a Profit and Loss Account in these financial statements as this company is a not-for-profit entity.

4. Provisions Available for Audits of Small Entities

In common with many other business of our size and nature, we use our auditors to assist with the preparation of the financial statements.
